## PFET Buck Controller for High Power LED Drivers

## General Description

The LM3409/09HV are P-channel MosFET (PFET) controllers for step-down (buck) current regulators. They offer wide input voltage range, high-side differential current sense with low adjustable threshold voltage, fast output enable/disable function and a thermally enhanced eMSOP-10 package. These features combine to make the LM3409/09HV ideal for use as constant current sources for driving LEDs where forward currents up to 5A are easily achievable. The LM3409/09Q/09HV/09QHV uses Constant Off-Time (COFT) control to regulate an accurate constant current without the need for external control loop compensation. Analog and PWM dimming are easy to implement and result in a highly linear dimming range with excellent achievable contrast ratios. Programmable UVLO, low-power shutdown, and thermal shutdown complete the feature set.

## Theory of Operation

The LM3409/09HV are P-channel MosFET (PFET) controllers for step-down (buck) current regulators which are ideal for driving LED loads. They have wide input voltage range allowing for regulation of a variety of LED loads. The high-side differential current sense, with low adjustable threshold voltage, provides an excellent method for regulating output current while maintaining high system efficiency. The LM3409/09HV uses a Controlled Off-Time (COFT) architecture that allows the converter to be operated in both continuous conduction mode (CCM) and discontinuous conduction mode (DCM) with no external control loop compensation, while providing an inherent cycle-by-cycle current limit. The adjustable current sense threshold provides the capability to amplitude (analog) dim the LED current over the full range and the fast output enable/disable function allows for high frequency PWM dimming using no external components. When designing, the maximum attainable LED current is not internally limited because the LM3409/09HV is a controller. Instead it is a function of the system operating point, component choices, and switching frequency allowing the LM3409/09HV to easily provide constant currents up to 5A. This simple controller contains all the features necessary to implement a high efficiency versatile LED driver.

## BUCK CURRENT REGULATORS

The buck regulator is unique among non-isolated topologies due to the direct connection of the inductor to the load during the entire switching cycle. An inductor will control the rate of change of current that flows through it, therefore a direct connection to the load is excellent for current regulation. A buck current regulator, using the LM3409/09HV, is shown in the Typical Application section on the first page of this datasheet. During the time that the PFET (Q1) is turned on ( $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{ON}}$ ), the input voltage charges up the inductor (L1). When Q1 is turned off ( $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{OFF}}$ ), the re-circulating diode (D1) becomes forward biased and L1 discharges. During both intervals, the current is supplied to the load keeping the LEDs forward biased. Figure 1 shows the inductor current $\left(\mathrm{i}_{\mathrm{L}}(\mathrm{t})\right)$ waveform for a buck converter operating in CCM.
The average inductor current $\left(I_{L}\right)$ is equal to the average output LED current ( $l_{\text {LED }}$ ), therefore if $I_{L}$ is tightly controlled, $I_{\text {LED }}$ will be well regulated. As the system changes input voltage or output voltage, duty cycle (D) is varied to regulate $I_{L}$ and ultimately $\mathrm{I}_{\text {LED }}$. For any buck regulator, D is simply the conversion ratio divided by the efficiency $(\eta)$ :

D=\frac{V_{0}}{\eta \times V_{I N}}

## CONTROLLED OFF-TIME (COFT) ARCHITECTURE

The COFT architecture is used by the LM3409/09HV to control $\mathrm{I}_{\text {LED }}$. It is a combination of peak current detection and a one-shot off-timer that varies with output voltage. D is indirectly controlled by changes in both $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{OFF}}$ and $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{ON}}$, which vary depending on the operating point. This creates a variable switching frequency over the entire operating range. This type of hysteretic control eliminates the need for control loop compensation necessary in many switching regulators, simplifying the design process and providing fast transient response.

## Adjustable Peak Current Control

At the beginning of a switching period, PFET Q1 is turned on and inductor current increases. Once peak current is detected, Q1 is turned off, the diode D1 forward biases, and inductor current decreases. Figure 2 shows how peak current detection is accomplished using the differential voltage signal created as current flows through the current setting resistor ( $\mathrm{R}_{\text {SNS }}$ ). The voltage across $\mathrm{R}_{\text {SNS }}\left(\mathrm{V}_{\text {SNS }}\right)$ is compared to the adjustable current sense threshold ( $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{CST}}$ ) and Q1 is turned off when $\mathrm{V}_{\text {SNS }}$ exceeds $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{CST}}$, providing that $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{ON}}$ is greater than the minimum possible $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{ON}}$ (typically 115 ns ).

There are three different methods to set the current sense threshold $\left(\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{CST}}\right)$ using the multi-function IADJ pin:

1. IADJ pin left open: $5 \mu \mathrm{~A}$ internal current source biases the Zener diode and clamps the IADJ pin voltage ( $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{ADJ}}$ ) at 1.24 V causing the maximum threshold voltage:

$$
V_{C S T}=\frac{V_{A D J}}{5 \times R} \times R=\frac{V_{A D J}}{5}=\frac{1.24 \mathrm{~V}}{5}=248 \mathrm{mV}
$$

2. External voltage $\left(\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{ADJ}}\right)$ of 0 V to 1.24 V : Apply to the IADJ pin to adjust $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{CST}}$ from 0 V to 248 mV . If the $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{ADJ}}$ voltage is adjustable, analog dimming can be achieved.
3. External resistor $\left(\mathrm{R}_{\text {EXT }}\right)$ placed from IADJ pin to ground: $5 \mu \mathrm{~A}$ current source sets the $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{ADJ}}$ voltage and corresponding threshold voltage:

$$
V_{C S T}=\frac{V_{A D J}}{5}=\frac{5 \mu A \times R_{E X T}}{5}=1 \mu A \times R_{E X T}
$$

## Controlled Off-Time

Once Q1 is turned off, it remains off for a constant time ( $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{OFF}}$ ) which is preset by an external resistor ( $\mathrm{R}_{\text {OFF }}$ ), an external capacitor ( $\mathrm{C}_{\text {OFF }}$ ), and the output voltage $\left(\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{O}}\right)$ as shown in Figure 3. Since $\mathrm{I}_{\text {LED }}$ is tightly regulated, $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{O}}$ will remain nearly constant over widely varying input voltage and temperature yielding a nearly constant $\mathrm{t}_{\text {OFF }}$.

At the start of $\mathrm{t}_{\text {OFF }}$, the voltage across $\mathrm{C}_{\text {OFF }}\left(\mathrm{v}_{\text {COFF }}(\mathrm{t})\right)$ is zero and the capacitor begins charging according to the time constant provided by $R_{\text {OFF }}$ and $\mathrm{C}_{\text {OFF. }}$. When $v_{\text {COFF }}(\mathrm{t})$ reaches the off-time threshold $\left(\mathrm{V}_{\text {OFT }}=1.24 \mathrm{~V}\right)$, then the off-time is terminated and $v_{\text {COFF }}(\mathrm{t})$ is reset to zero. $\mathrm{t}_{\text {OFF }}$ is calculated as follows:

$$
t_{\text {OFF }}=-R_{\text {OFF }} \times\left(C_{\text {OFF }}+20 \mathrm{pF}\right) \times \ln \left(1-\frac{1.24 \mathrm{~V}}{V_{\mathrm{O}}}\right)
$$

In reality, there is typically 20 pF parasitic capacitance at the off-timer pin in parallel with $\mathrm{C}_{\text {OFF }}$, which is accounted for in the calculation of $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{OFF}}$. Also, it should be noted that the $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{OFF}}$ equation has a preceding negative sign because the result of the logarithm should be negative for a properly designed circuit. The resulting $\mathrm{t}_{\text {OFF }}$ is a positive value as long as $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{O}}$ > 1.24 V . If $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{O}}<1.24 \mathrm{~V}$, the off-timer cannot reach $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{OFT}}$ and an internally limited maximum off-time (typically $300 \mu \mathrm{~s}$ ) will occur.

Although the $t_{\text {OFF }}$ equation is non-linear, $t_{\text {OFF }}$ is actually very linear in most applications. Ignoring the 20pF parasitic capacitance at the COFF pin, $\mathrm{v}_{\text {COFF }}(\mathrm{t})$ is plotted in Figure 4. The time derivative of $\mathrm{v}_{\text {COFF }}(\mathrm{t})$ can be calculated to find a linear approximation to the $t_{\text {OFF }}$ equation:

$$
\frac{d v_{\text {COFF }}(t)}{d t}=\frac{V_{O}}{R_{\text {OFF }} \times C_{\text {OFF }}} e^{-\left(\frac{t_{\text {OFF }}}{R_{\text {OFF }} \times C_{\text {OFF }}}\right)}

When $t_{\text {OFF }} \ll R_{\text {OFF }} \times C_{\text {OFF }}$ (equivalent to when $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{O}} \gg 1.24 \mathrm{~V}$ ), the slope of the function is essentially linear and $t_{\text {OFF }}$ can be approximated as a current source charging $\mathrm{C}_{\mathrm{OFF}}$ :

$$
t_{\mathrm{OFF}} \approx \frac{1.24 \mathrm{~V} \times \mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{OFF}} \times \mathrm{C}_{\mathrm{OFF}}}{\mathrm{~V}_{\mathrm{O}}}
$$

Using the actual $t_{\text {OFF }}$ equation, the inductor current ripple ( $\Delta \mathrm{i}_{\mathrm{L}-\mathrm{PP}}$ ) of a buck current regulator operating in CCM is:


Using the $\mathrm{t}_{\text {OFF }}$ approximation, the equation is reduced to:

$$
\Delta \mathrm{i}_{\mathrm{L}-\mathrm{PP}} \approx \frac{1.24 \times \mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{OFF}} \times \mathrm{C}_{\mathrm{OFF}}}{\mathrm{~L} 1}
$$

## $\Delta i_{\text {L-PP }}$ is independent of both $V_{I N}$ and $V_{O}$ when in CCM!

 The $\Delta \mathrm{i}_{\text {L-pp }}$ approximation only depends on $\mathrm{R}_{\text {OFF }}, \mathrm{C}_{\text {OFF }}$, and L1, therefore the ripple is essentially constant over the operating range as long as $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{O}} \gg 1.24 \mathrm{~V}$ (when the $\mathrm{t}_{\text {OFF }}$ approximation is valid). An exception to the $t_{\text {OFF }}$ approximation occurs if the IADJ pin is used to analog dim. As the LED/inductor current decreases, the converter will eventually enter DCM and the ripple will decrease with the peak current threshold. The approximation shows how the LM3409/09HV achieves constant ripple over a wide operating range, however $t_{\text {OFF }}$ should be calculated using the actual equation first presented.
## AVERAGE LED CURRENT

For a buck converter，the average LED current is simply the average inductor current．

Using the COFT architecture，the peak transistor current（ $I_{T}$ ． max）is sensed as shown in Figure 5，which is equal to the peak inductor current（ $\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{L}-\mathrm{MAX}}$ ）given by the following equation：

$$
I_{L-M A X}=I_{T-M A X}=\frac{V_{C S T}}{R_{S N S}}=\frac{V_{A D J}}{5 \times R_{S N S}}

Because $\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{L}-\mathrm{MAX}}$ is set using peak current control and $\Delta \mathrm{i}_{\mathrm{L} \text {－PP }}$ is set using the controlled off－timer， $\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{L}}$ and correspondingly $\mathrm{I}_{\text {LED }}$ can be calculated as follows：

I_{L E D}=I_{L}=I_{L-M A X}-\frac{\Delta i_{L-P P}}{2}=\frac{V_{A D J}}{5 \times R_{S N S}}-\frac{V_{O} \times t_{\mathrm{OFF}}}{2 \times L 1}

The threshold voltage $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{CST}}$ seen by the high－side sense com－ parator is affected by the comparator＇s input offset voltage， which causes an error in the calculation of $\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{L} \text {－MAX }}$ and ulti－ mately $\mathrm{I}_{\text {LED }}$ ． To mitigate this problem，the polarity of the com－ parator inputs is swapped every cycle，which causes the actual $\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{L} \text {－MAX }}$ to alternate between two peak values（ $\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{L} \text {－MAXH }}$ and $\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{L}-\mathrm{MAXL}}$ ），equidistant from the theoretical $\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{L} \text {－MAX }}$ as shown in Figure 6． $\mathrm{I}_{\text {LED }}$ remains accurate through this averaging．

## INDUCTOR CURRENT RIPPLE

Because the LM3409／09HV swaps the polarity of the differ－ ential current sense comparator every cycle，a minimum in－ ductor current ripple（ $\Delta \mathrm{i}_{\text {L－PP }}$ ）is necessary to maintain accurate $\mathrm{I}_{\text {LED }}$ regulation．Referring to Figure 6，the first $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{ON}}$ is terminated at the higher of the two polarity－swapped thresh－ olds（corresponding to $\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{L} \text { MAXH }}$ ）．During the following $\mathrm{t}_{\text {OFF }}, \mathrm{i}_{\mathrm{L}}$ decreases until the second $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{ON}}$ begins．If $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{OFF}}$ is too short，then as the second $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{ON}}$ begins， $\mathrm{i}_{\mathrm{L}}$ will still be above the lower peak current threshold（corresponding to $\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{L} \text { MAXL }}$ ）and a minimum $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{ON}}$ pulse will follow．This will result in degraded $\mathrm{I}_{\text {LED }}$ regula－ tion．The minimum inductor current ripple（ $\Delta \mathrm{i}_{\text {L－PP－MIN }}$ ）should adhere to the following equation in order to ensure accurate $I_{\text {LED }}$ regulation：

\Delta \mathrm{L}_{\mathrm{L}-\mathrm{PP}-\mathrm{MIN}}>\frac{24 \mathrm{mV}}{\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{SNS}}}

## SWITCHING FREQUENCY

The switching frequency is dependent upon the actual oper－ ating point $\left(\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{IN}_{\mathrm{N}}}\right.$ and $\left.\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{O}}\right)$ ． $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{O}}$ will remain relatively constant for a given application，therefore the switching frequency will vary with $\mathrm{V}_{\text {IN }}$（frequency increases as $\mathrm{V}_{\text {IN }}$ increases）．The target switching frequency（ $\mathrm{f}_{\mathrm{SW}}$ ）at the nominal operating point is selected based on the tradeoffs between efficiency（better at low frequency）and solution size／cost（smaller at high fre－ quency）．The off－time of the LM3409／09HV can be pro－ grammed for switching frequencies up to 5 MHz （theoretical limit imposed by minimum $t_{O N}$ ）．In practice，switching fre－ quencies higher than 1 MHz may be difficult to obtain due to gate drive limitations，high input voltage，and thermal consid－ erations．
At CCM operating points，$f_{S W}$ is defined as：

$$
\mathrm{f}_{\mathrm{SW}}=\frac{1-\mathrm{D}}{\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{OFF}}}=\frac{1-\left(\frac{\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{O}}}{\eta \times V_{\mathrm{IN}}}\right)}{\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{OFF}}}
$$

At DCM operating points， $\mathrm{f}_{\mathrm{SW}}$ is defined as：

$$
f_{S W}=\frac{1}{t_{\text {ON }}+t_{\text {OFF }}}=\frac{1}{\left(\frac{L_{L-M A X} \times L_{1}}{V_{I N}-V_{O}}\right)+t_{\text {OFF }}}
$$

In the CCM equation，it is apparent that the efficiency（ $\eta$ ）fac－ tors into the switching frequency calculation．Efficiency is hard to estimate and，since switching frequency varies with input voltage，accuracy in setting the nominal switching frequency is not critical．Therefore，a general rule of thumb for the LM3409／09HV is to assume an efficiency between $85 \%$ and $100 \%$ ．When approximating efficiency to target a nominal switching frequency，the following condition must be met：

## PWM DIMMING USING THE EN PIN

The enable pin (EN) is a TTL compatible input for PWM dimming of the LED. A logic low (below 0.5 V ) at EN will disable the internal driver and shut off the current flow to the LED array. While the EN pin is in a logic low state the support circuitry (driver, bandgap, $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{CC}}$ regulator) remains active in order to minimize the time needed to turn the LED array back on when the EN pin sees a logic high (above 1.74 V ).
Figure 7 shows the LED current ( $\mathrm{i}_{\text {LED }}(\mathrm{t})$ ) during PWM dimming where duty cycle ( $\mathrm{D}_{\text {DIM }}$ ) is the percentage of the dimming period ( $\mathrm{T}_{\text {DIM }}$ ) that the PFET is switching. For the remainder of $\mathrm{T}_{\text {DIM }}$, the PFET is disabled. The resulting dimmed average LED current ( $\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{DIM}-\mathrm{LED}}$ ) is:

$$
I_{\text {DIM-LED }}=D_{\text {DIM }} \times I_{\text {LED }}
$$

The LED current rise and fall times (which are limited by the slew rate of the inductor as well as the delay from activation of the EN pin to the response of the external PFET) limit the achievable $T_{\text {DIM }}$ and $D_{\text {DIM }}$. In general, dimming frequency should be at least one order of magnitude lower than the steady state switching frequency in order to prevent aliasing. However, for good linear response across the entire dimming range, the dimming frequency may need to be even lower.

## HIGH VOLTAGE NEGATIVE BIAS REGULATOR

The LM3409/09HV contains an internal linear regulator where the steady state VCC pin voltage is typically 6.2 V below the voltage at the VIN pin. The VCC pin should be bypassed to the VIN pin with at least $1 \mu \mathrm{~F}$ of ceramic capacitance connected as close as possible to the IC.

## INPUT UNDER-VOLTAGE LOCKOUT (UVLO)

Under-voltage lockout is set with a resistor divider from $\mathrm{V}_{\text {IN }}$ to GND and is compared against a 1.24 V threshold as shown in Figure 8. Once the input voltage is above the preset UVLO rising threshold (and assuming the part is enabled), the internal circuitry becomes active and a $22 \mu \mathrm{~A}$ current source at the UVLO pin is turned on. This extra current provides hysteresis to create a lower UVLO falling threshold. The resistor divider is chosen to set both the UVLO rising and falling thresholds.

The turn-on threshold $\left(\mathrm{V}_{\text {TURN-ON }}\right)$ is defined as follows:

\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{TURN}-\mathrm{ON}}=\frac{1.24 \mathrm{~V} \times\left(\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{UV} 1}+\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{UV} 2}\right)}{\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{UV} 1}}
$$

The hysteresis ( $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{HYS}}$ ) is defined as follows:

$$
V_{H Y S}=R_{U V 2} \times 22 \mu A
$$

## LOW POWER SHUTDOWN

The LM3409/09HV can be placed into a low power shutdown (typically $110 \mu \mathrm{~A}$ ) by grounding the EN terminal (any voltage below 0.5 V ) until $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{CC}}$ drops below the $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{CC}}$ UVLO threshold (typically 3.73V). During normal operation this terminal should be tied to a voltage above 1.74 V and below absolute maximum input voltage rating.

## THERMAL SHUTDOWN

Internal thermal shutdown circuitry is provided to protect the IC in the event that the maximum junction temperature is exceeded. The threshold for thermal shutdown is $160^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ with $15^{\circ}$ C of hysteresis (both values typical). During thermal shutdown the PFET and driver are disabled.

## Design Considerations

## OPERATION NEAR DROPOUT

Because the power MosFET is a PFET, the LM3409/09HV can be operated into dropout which occurs when the input voltage is approximately equal to output voltage. Once the input voltage drops below the nominal output voltage, the switch remains constantly on ( $\mathrm{D}=1$ ) causing the output voltage to decrease with the input voltage. In normal operation, the average LED current is regulated to the peak current threshold minus half of the ripple. As the converter goes into dropout, the LED current is exactly at the peak current threshold because it is no longer switching. This causes the LED current to increase by half of the set ripple current as it makes the transition into dropout. Therefore, the inductor current ripple should be kept as small as possible (while remaining above the previously established minimum) and output capacitance should be added to help maintain good line regulation when approaching dropout.

## LED RIPPLE CURRENT

Selection of the ripple current through the LED array is analogous to the selection of output ripple voltage in a standard voltage regulator. Where the output voltage ripple in a voltage regulator is commonly $\pm 1 \%$ to $\pm 5 \%$ of the DC output voltage, LED manufacturers generally recommend values for $\triangle \mathrm{i}_{\text {LED }}$ PP ranging from $\pm 5 \%$ to $\pm 20 \%$ of $\mathrm{I}_{\text {LED }}$. For a nominal system operating point, a larger $\Delta \mathrm{i}_{\text {LED-PP }}$ specification can reduce the necessary inductor size and/or allow for smaller output capacitors (or no output capacitors at all) which helps to minimize the total solution size and cost. On the other hand, a smaller $\Delta \mathrm{i}_{\text {LED-PP }}$ specification would require more output inductance, a higher switching frequency, or additional output capacitance.

## BUCK CONVERTERS W/O OUTPUT CAPACITORS

Because current is being regulated, not voltage, a buck current regulator is free of load current transients, therefore output capacitance is not needed to supply the load and maintain output voltage. This is very helpful when high frequency PWM dimming the LED load. When no output capacitor is used, the same design equations that govern $\Delta \mathrm{i}_{\text {L-pp }}$ also apply to $\Delta \mathrm{i}_{\text {LED-PP }}$.

## BUCK CONVERTERS WITH OUTPUT CAPACITORS

A capacitor placed in parallel with the LED load can be used to reduce $\Delta \mathrm{i}_{\text {LED-PP }}$ while keeping the same average current through both the inductor and the LED array. With an output capacitor, the inductance can be lowered, making the magnetics smaller and less expensive. Alternatively, the circuit can be run at lower frequency with the same inductor value, improving the efficiency and increasing the maximum allowable average output voltage. A parallel output capacitor is also useful in applications where the inductor or input voltage tolerance is poor. Adding a capacitor that reduces $\Delta \mathrm{i}_{\text {LED-PP }}$ to well below the target provides headroom for changes in inductance or $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{IN}}$ that might otherwise push the maximum $\Delta \mathrm{i}_{\text {LED-PP }}$ too high

Output capacitance $\left(\mathrm{C}_{\mathrm{O}}\right)$ is determined knowing the desired $\Delta i_{\text {LED-PP }}$ and the LED dynamic resistance ( $r_{\mathrm{D}}$ ). $\mathrm{r}_{\mathrm{D}}$ can be calculated as the slope of the LED's exponential DC characteristic at the nominal operating point as shown in Figure 9. Simply dividing the forward voltage by the forward current at the nominal operating point will give an incorrect value that is $5 x$ to $10 x$ too high. Total dynamic resistance for a string of $n$ LEDs connected in series can be calculated as the $r_{D}$ of one device multiplied by n . The following equations can then be used to estimate $\Delta \mathrm{i}_{\text {LED-PP }}$ when using a parallel capacitor:

$$
\begin{gathered}
\Delta i_{\text {LED-PP }}=\frac{\Delta i_{\text {L-PP }}}{1+\frac{r_{D}}{Z_{C}}} \\
Z_{C}=\frac{1}{2 \times \pi \times f_{S W} \times C_{O}}
\end{gathered}
$$

In general, $Z_{C}$ should be at least half of $r_{D}$ to effectively reduce the ripple. Ceramic capacitors are the best choice for the output capacitors due to their high ripple current rating, low ESR, low cost, and small size compared to other types. When selecting a ceramic capacitor, special attention must be paid to the operating conditions of the application. Ceramic capacitors can lose one-half or more of their capacitance at their rated DC voltage bias and also lose capacitance with extremes in temperature. Make sure to check any recommended deratings and also verify if there is any significant change in capacitance at the operating voltage and temperature.

## OUTPUT OVER-VOLTAGE PROTECTION

Because the LM3409/09HV controls a buck current regulator, there is no inherent need to provide output over-voltage protection. If the LED load is opened, the output voltage will only rise as high as the input voltage plus any ringing due to the parasitic inductance and capacitance present at the output node. If a ceramic output capacitor is used in the application, it should have a minimum rating equal to the input voltage. Ringing seen at the output node should not damage most ceramic capacitors, due to their high ripple current rating.

## INPUT CAPACITORS

Input capacitors are selected using requirements for minimum capacitance and RMS ripple current. The PFET current during $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{ON}}$ is approximately $\mathrm{I}_{\text {LED }}$, therefore the input capacitors discharge the difference between $\mathrm{I}_{\text {LED }}$ and the average input current $\left(\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{I}}\right)$ during $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{ON}}$. During $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{OFF}}$, the input voltage source charges up the input capacitors with $\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{IN}}$. The minimum input capacitance $\left(\mathrm{C}_{\text {IN-MIN }}\right)$ is selected using the maximum input voltage ripple ( $\Delta \mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{IN}-\mathrm{MAX}}$ ) which can be tolerated. $\Delta \mathrm{v}_{\mathrm{IN}-\mathrm{MAX}}$ is equal to the change in voltage across $\mathrm{C}_{\text {IN }}$ during $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{ON}}$ when it supplies the load current. A good starting point for selection of $\mathrm{C}_{\text {IN }}$ is to use $\Delta \mathrm{V}_{\text {IN-MAX }}$ of $2 \%$ to $10 \%$ of $\mathrm{V}_{\text {IN }}$. $\mathrm{C}_{\text {IN-MIN }}$ can be selected as follows:

$$
C_{I N-M I N}=\frac{I_{\text {LED }} \times t_{O N}}{\Delta v_{I N-M A X}}=\frac{I_{\text {LED }} x\left(\frac{1}{f_{S W}}-t_{\text {OFF }}\right)}{\Delta v_{I N-M A X}}
$$

An input capacitance at least 75\% greater than the calculated $\mathrm{C}_{\text {IN-MIN }}$ value is recommended. To determine the RMS input current rating ( $\mathrm{l}_{\mathrm{IN}-\mathrm{RMS}}$ ) the following approximation can be used:

$$
I_{I_{N-R M S}}=I_{\text {LED }} \times \sqrt{D \times(1-D)}=I_{\text {LED }} \times f_{S W} \times \sqrt{t_{\mathrm{ON}} \times t_{\mathrm{OFF}}}
$$

Since this approximation assumes there is no inductor ripple current, the value should be increased by 10-30\% depending on the amount of ripple that is expected. Ceramic capacitors are the best choice for input capacitors for the same reasons mentioned in the Buck Converters with Output Capacitors section. Careful selection of the capacitor requires checking capacitance ratings at the nominal operating voltage and temperature.

## P-CHANNEL MosFET (PFET)

The LM3409/09HV requires an external PFET (Q1) as the main power MosFET for the switching regulator. Q1 should have a voltage rating at least $15 \%$ higher than the maximum input voltage to ensure safe operation during the ringing of the switch node. In practice all switching converters have some ringing at the switch node due to the diode parasitic capacitance and the lead inductance. The PFET should also have a current rating at least $10 \%$ higher than the average transistor current $\left(\mathrm{l}_{\mathrm{T}}\right)$ :

$$
I_{T}=D \times I_{L E D}
$$

The power rating is verified by calculating the power loss $\left(\mathrm{P}_{\mathrm{T}}\right)$ using the RMS transistor current ( $\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{T} \text {-RMS }}$ ) and the PFET on-resistance ( $\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{DS}-\mathrm{ON}}$ ):

$$
\begin{gathered}
I_{T-R M S}=I_{\text {LED }} \times \sqrt{D x\left(1+\frac{1}{12} \times\left(\frac{\Delta i_{L-P P}}{I_{L E D}}\right)^{2}\right)} \\
P_{T}=I_{T-R M S}{ }^{2} \times R_{D S O N}
\end{gathered}
$$

It is important to consider the gate charge of Q1. As the input voltage increases from a nominal voltage to its maximum input voltage, the COFT architecture will naturally increase the switching frequency. The dominant switching losses are determined by input voltage, switching frequency, and PFET total gate charge $\left(Q_{g}\right)$. The LM3409/09HV has to provide and remove charge $\mathrm{Q}_{\mathrm{g}}$ from the input capacitance of Q1 in order to turn it on and off. This occurs more often at higher switching frequencies which requires more current from the internal regulator, thereby increasing internal power dissipation and eventually causing the LM3409/09HV to thermally cycle. For a given range of operating points the only effective way to reduce these switching losses is to minimize $Q_{g}$.
A good rule of thumb is to limit $Q_{g}<30 \mathrm{nC}$ (if the switching frequency remains below 300 kHz for the entire operating range then a larger $Q_{g}$ can be considered). If a PFET with small $R_{D S-O N}$ and a high voltage rating is required, there may be no choice but to use a PFET with $Q_{g}>30 \mathrm{nC}$.
When using a PFET with $Q_{g}>30 n C$, the bypass capacitor $\left(\mathrm{C}_{\mathrm{F}}\right)$ should not be connected to the VIN pin. This will ensure that peak current detection through $\mathrm{R}_{\text {SNS }}$ is not affected by the charging of the PFET input capacitance during switching, which can cause false triggering of the peak detection comparator. Instead, $C_{F}$ should be connected from the VCC pin to the CSN pin which will cause a small DC offset in $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{CST}}$ and ultimately $\mathrm{I}_{\text {LED }}$, however it avoids the problematic false triggering.
In general, the PFET should be chosen to meet the $Q_{g}$ specification whenever possible, while minimizing $R_{D S-O N}$. This will minimize power losses while ensuring the part functions correctly over the full operating range.

## RE-CIRCULATING DIODE

A re-circulating diode (D1) is required to carry the inductor current during $t_{\text {OFFF }}$. The most efficient choice for D1 is a Schottky diode due to low forward voltage drop and near-zero reverse recovery time. Similar to Q1, D1 must have a voltage rating at least $15 \%$ higher than the maximum input voltage to ensure safe operation during the ringing of the switch node and a current rating at least $10 \%$ higher than the average diode current ( $l_{\mathrm{D}}$ ):

$$
I_{D}=(1-D) \times I_{L E D}
$$

The power rating is verified by calculating the power loss through the diode. This is accomplished by checking the typical diode forward voltage ( $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{D}}$ ) from the I-V curve on the product datasheet and calculating as follows:

$$
P_{D}=I_{D} \times V_{D}
$$

In general, higher current diodes have a lower $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{D}}$ and come in better performing packages minimizing both power losses and temperature rise.

## EXTERNAL PARALLEL FET PWM DIMMING

Any buck topology LED driver is a good candidate for parallel FET dimming because high slew rates are achievable, due to the fact that no output capacitance is required. This allows for much higher dimming frequencies than are achievable using the EN pin. When using external parallel FET dimming, a situation can arise where maximum off-time occurs due to a shorted output. To mitigate this situation, capacitive coupling to the enable pin can be employed.

As shown in Figure 11, a small capacitor $\left(\mathrm{C}_{\text {EXT }}\right)$ is connected from the gate drive signal of the parallel Dim FET to the EN pin and a pull-up resistor ( $\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{EXT}}$ ) is placed from the EN pin to the external $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{DD}}$ supply for the Dim FET gate driver. This forces the on-timer to restart corresponding to every rising edge of the LED voltage, ensuring that the unwanted maximum off-time condition does not occur. With this type of dimming, the EN pin does not control the dimming; it simply resets the controller. A good design choice is to size $\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{EXT}}$ and $\mathrm{C}_{\mathrm{EXT}}$ to give a time constant smaller than $\mathrm{t}_{\mathrm{OFF}}$ :

$$
t_{\mathrm{OFF}}>R_{\mathrm{EXT}} \times \mathrm{C}_{\mathrm{EXT}}
$$

The ideal LED current waveform $\mathrm{i}_{\text {LED }}(\mathrm{t})$ during parallel FET PWM dimming is very similar to the EN pin PWM dimming shown previously. The LED current does not rise and fall infinitely fast as shown in Figure 10 however with this method, only the speed of the parallel Dim FET ultimately limits the dimming frequency and dimming duty cycle. This allows for much faster PWM dimming than can be attained with the EN pin.

## CIRCUIT LAYOUT

The performance of any switching converter depends as much upon the layout of the PCB as the component selection. Following a few simple guidelines will maximimize noise rejection and minimize the generation of EMI within the circuit.
Discontinuous currents are the most likely to generate EMI, therefore care should be taken when routing these paths. The main path for discontinuous current in the LM3409/09HV buck converter contains the input capacitor $\left(\mathrm{C}_{\mathrm{IN}}\right)$, the recirculating diode (D1), the P-channel MosFET (Q1), and the sense resistor ( $\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{SNS}}$ ). This loop should be kept as small as possible and the connections between all three components should be short and thick to minimize parasitic inductance. In particular, the switch node (where L1, D1 and Q1 connect) should be just large enough to connect the components without excessive heating from the current it carries.
The IADJ, COFF, CSN and CSP pins are all high-impedance control inputs which couple external noise easily, therefore the loops containing these high impedance nodes should be minimized. The most sensitive loop contains the sense resistor ( $\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{SNS}}$ ) which should be placed as close as possible to the CSN and CSP pins to maximize noise rejection. The off-time capacitor ( $\mathrm{C}_{\mathrm{OFF}}$ ) should be placed close to the COFF and GND pins for the same reason. Finally, if an external resistor $\left(R_{\text {EXT }}\right)$ is used to bias the IADJ pin, it should be placed close to the IADJ and GND pins, also.
In some applications the LED or LED array can be far away (several inches or more) from the LM3409/09HV, or on a separate PCB connected by a wiring harness. When an output capacitor is used and the LED array is large or separated from the rest of the converter, the output capacitor should be placed close to the LEDs to reduce the effects of parasitic inductance on the AC impedance of the capacitor.

## 1. NOMINAL SWITCHING FREQUENCY

Calculate switching frequency ( $\mathrm{f}_{\mathrm{sw}}$ ) at the nominal operating point ( $\mathrm{V}_{\text {IN }}$ and $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{O}}$ ). Assume a $\mathrm{C}_{\text {OFF }}$ value (between 470 pF and 1 nF ) and a system efficiency ( $\mathrm{\eta})$. Solve for $\mathrm{R}_{\text {OFF: }}$ :

Peak inductor current is detected across the sense resistor $\left(\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{SNS}}\right)$. In most cases, assume the maximum value $\left(\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{ADJ}}=\right.$ 1.24 V ) at the IADJ pin and solve for $\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{SNS}}$ :

If the calculated $R_{\text {SNS }}$ is far from a standard value, the beginning of the process can be iterated to choose a new $\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{OFF}}, \mathrm{L} 1$, and $R_{\text {SNS }}$ value that is a closer fit. The easiest way to approach the iterative process is to change the nominal $f_{s w}$ target knowing that the switching frequency varies with operating conditions anyways.
Another method for finding a standard $R_{\text {SNS }}$ value is to change the $V_{A D J}$ value. However, this would require an external voltage source or a resistor from the IADJ pin to GND as explained in the Theory of Operation section of this datasheet.

## 4．OUTPUT CAPACITANCE

A minimum output capacitance（ $\mathrm{C}_{\mathrm{O} \text {－MIN }}$ ）may be necessary to reduce $\Delta \mathrm{i}_{\text {LED－PP }}$ below $\Delta \mathrm{i}_{\text {L－PP }}$ ．With the specified $\Delta \mathrm{i}_{\text {LED－PP }}$ and the known dynamic resistance（ $r_{D}$ ）of the LED string，solve for the required impedance $\left(Z_{C}\right)$ for $C_{O-M I N}$ ：

## 7．DIODE

The Schottky diode needs a voltage rating similar to the PFET．Higher current diodes with a lower forward voltage are suggested．Given a diode with forward voltage $\left(\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{D}}\right)$ ，solve for the average diode current $\left(I_{D}\right)$ and power dissipation $\left(P_{D}\right)$ ：

## 8．INPUT UVLO

Input UVLO is set with the turn－on threshold voltage（ $\mathrm{V}_{\text {TURN }}$ ． ${ }_{\mathrm{oN}}$ ）and the desired hysteresis（ $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{HYS}}$ ）．To set $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{HYS}}$ ，solve for $\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{UV} 2}$ ：

## 9．IADJ CONNECTION METHOD

The IADJ pin controls the high－side current sense threshold in three ways outlined in the Theory of Operation section．
Method \＃1：Leave IADJ pin open and $\mathrm{I}_{\text {LED }}$ is calculated as in the Average LED Current section of the Design Guide．
Method \＃2：Apply an external voltage（ $\mathrm{V}_{\mathrm{ADJ}}$ ）to the IADJ pin between 0 and 1.24 V to analog dim or to reduce $\mathrm{I}_{\text {LED }}$ as fol－ lows：

Keep in mind that analog dimming will eventually push the converter in to DCM and the inductor current ripple will no longer be constant causing a divergence from linear dimming at low levels．
A $0.1 \mu \mathrm{~F}$ capacitor connected from the IADJ pin to GND is recommended when using this method．It may also be nec－ essary to have a $1 \mathrm{k} \Omega$ series resistor with the capacitor to create an RC filter．The filter will help remove high frequency noise created by other connected circuitry．
Method \＃3：Connect an external resistor or potentiometer to GND（ $\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{EXT}}$ ）and the internal $5 \mu \mathrm{~A}$ current source will set the voltage．Again，a $0.1 \mu \mathrm{~F}$ capacitor connected from the IADJ pin to GND is recommended．To set $\mathrm{I}_{\text {LED }}$ ，solve for $\mathrm{R}_{\text {EXT }}$ ：


## 10．PWM DIMMING METHOD

There are two methods to PWM dim using the LM3409／09HV：
Method \＃1：Apply an external PWM signal to the EN terminal．
Method \＃2：Perform external parallel FET shunt dimming as detailed in the External Parallel FET PWM Dimming section．
